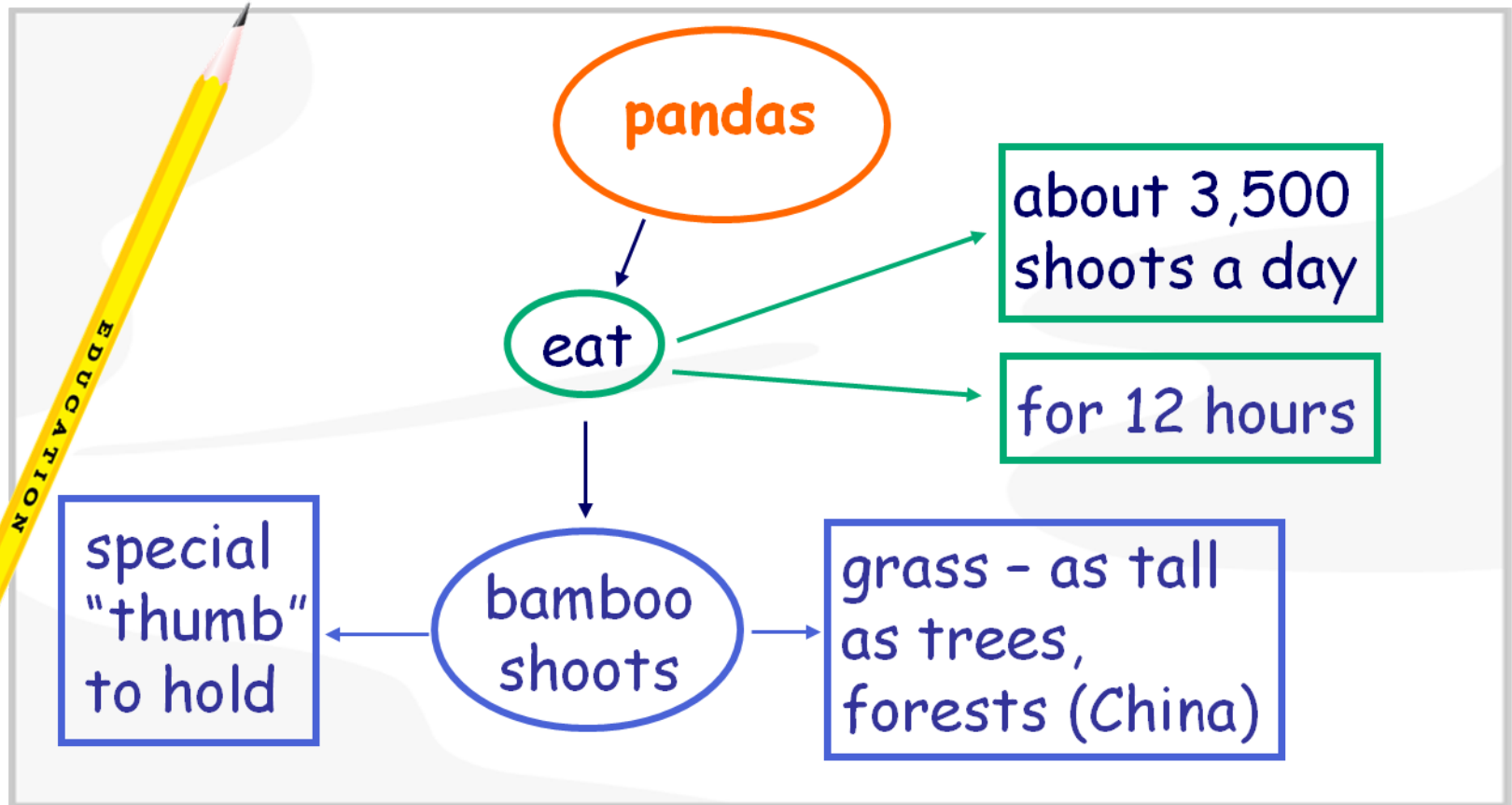


Making notes
