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Using punctuation to add information



We can use different punctuation marks to help us add extra information to a sentence. This is called 'parenthesis'.

When something is put 'in parenthesis' this means it is separated from the main part of the sentence by a pair of parentheses, commas or dashes.

Round parentheses (()) and pairs of dashes (–) allow you to add extra information to a sentence which is **useful** – but not essential – or to add your **opinion**.

How do you know when to use parentheses and when to use dashes?

To make that decision it is necessary to understand that each form of punctuation interrupts the flow of the text to a different degree.





Round parentheses



Round parentheses allow you to add extra information to a sentence without interrupting the flow too much. The information they contain is like a silent thought.

For example:

Star goalie Danny Campbell (age 16) was (unfortunately for his team) injured before the game.

The sentence still makes sense without the extra information in the parentheses.

Star goalie Danny Campbell was injured before the game.

Pairs of dashes



Pairs of dashes interrupt the flow of a sentence more strongly.

They deliberately draw the reader's attention to important additional information. The information they contain is like an additional thought that is said out loud.

Natalie screamed at her family and then slammed the door.

The extra information is placed between the dashes for emphasis, but the sentence still makes sense without it.
